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# Finance MEC tables Limpopo Budget Adjustment

The MEC for Finance, Mr Kgabo Mahoai, presented the adjustment budget outlining changes to each department's allocation.

The Office of the Premier saw a decrease of R33.329 million, while the Provincial Legislature received an increase of R89.002 million to support its oversight mandate.

Education received a significant boost of R843.822 million, primarily for teacher appointments, scholar transport, and infrastructure repairs.

Agriculture and Rural Development got R49.025 million more, focusing on goods and services, infrastructure, and tools.

Health received R521.783 million, targeting healthcare professional appointments, medicine, and equipment.



Transport and Community Safety decreased by R112.471 million, Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure increased by R316.664 million, Sport, Arts and Culture saw a decrease of R125 million, CoGHSTA's allocation rose by R267.035 million, and Social Development's budget remained unchanged.

# LPT held extended Supply Chain Management Forum



Limpopo Provincial Treasury held an extended Supply Chain Management Forum at Bolivia Lodge, Polokwane. The forum serves as a platform for Supply Chain practitioners to share knowledge and collaborate among professionals with the aim to enhance supply chain efficiency and resilience.



The Acting DDG for Asset, Liabilities & Supply Chain Management Ms Betty Rakubu stated that: *“The session was extended to Internal Control and Chief Risk Officers and National Treasury, which is currently working on Supply Chain Compliance Risk Assessment Management tool to give update to the organs of state.”*



Ms Betty Rakubu highlighted that the purpose of the forum is to conduct an introspection after the Auditor-General of South Africa has issued Audit reports for government departments and entities as per the Public Finance Management Act (PFMA) to ensure accountability for public funds.



During the forum, the institutions that got clean Audits opinions were shared best practices with other departments on how they made it. Furthermore, departments and entities were encouraged to seek help from Limpopo Treasury to foster a culture of compliance by providing training and capacity-building programme, record keeping and information sharing. All our Districts Client Support Centres were in attendance to gain valuable information.

Various stakeholders from public and private institutions gathered at Mohlaletse Community Hall, at Fetakgomo Tubatse Local Municipality under the Sekhukhune District Municipality as part of the South African Social Security Agency Integrated Community Registration Outreach Programme. The agency invited the Departments to ensure that communities are empowered on government services for channeling their queries to the right departments.



Limpopo Provincial Treasury took the opportunity to provide insight into the Central Supplier Database and Requests for Quotations (RFQ) to potential suppliers in the area. The Sekhukhune District Supply Chain Management Client Support provided information and addressed related questions pertaining to Limpopo Provincial Treasury.

Mr Livhuwani Nemukula, Assistant Director, responsible for Sekhukhune District Supply Chain Management, highlighted the services available and the requirements needed to register on the Central Suppliers Database, enabling interested suppliers to do business with the state and contribute to the rural and township economy.

Stakeholders in attendance included the Department of Social Development, Department of Labour, banking sector, Limpopo Gambling Board, local traditional leadership, Sekhukhune TVET, Ward Committees, and Ward Councillors.

# Department restrengthening of risks

Limpopo Provincial Treasury held an Annual Strategic Risk Assessment session, facilitated by Ms Khulekelwe Mbonambi, an independent Chairperson of the Risk Management Committee. The Head of Department, Mr Gavin Pratt, led the Treasury Senior Management team, which was held at Protea Landmark Lodge in Polokwane.

The main purpose of the Annual Strategic Risk Assessment workshop for Limpopo Provincial Treasury is to review and reassess the strategic risks for the 2026/2027 financial year. This session also identified and assessed any new or emerging strategic risks that may prevent the department from achieving its strategic objectives, through a structured facilitated process.

This risk assessment follows the strategic planning session held in the month of September 2025. Additionally, the session sought to analyze risks and put mitigation factors in place to ensure compliance with regulations and policies.



# Building a disability-inclusive society

Limpopo Provincial Government has tailored training targeting persons with disabilities for a economic development workshops. These district-wide sessions for Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) and cooperatives owned by persons with disabilities, aimed to ensure that they are not left behind in growing and contributing to the province's economy. The training coincided with the theme *“Creating Strategic multi-sectoral partnerships for a Disability-inclusive society.”* The training was a collaborative initiative of Limpopo Provincial Treasury, Limpopo Economic Development, Environment and Tourism and its entity Limpopo Economic Development (LEDA), to converge with relevant departments and entities, to ensure and underscore the importance of removing barriers, to enable companies owned by persons with disabilities to become eligible to do business with government.



Throughout all the districts, these were held over two-day sessions focusing on compliance and business funding support. Departments such as Limpopo Provincial Treasury, LEDET, Department of Employment and Labour, and entities like LEDA and the South African Revenue Services, coupled with Standard Bank, outlined their services in supporting the growth and sustainability of businesses. It is important for directors of companies to pay their fair share of tax to increase the economy of the country. Ms Karabo Kolobe from the Limpopo Economic Development Agency said, *“We are mandated by the Provincial Government to do these workshops on economic development. This is part of the National Development Plan and ensures that no one is left behind.”*

The workshop took place when the country was observing Disability Rights Awareness Month (DRAM) under the theme *“Creating strategic multi-sectoral partnerships for a Disability-inclusive society.”* The theme highlights the importance of removing barriers that limit access to education, employment, healthcare, technology, social and economic participation for persons with disabilities. *“As persons with disabilities, you are eligible to do business with the state. Our job is to assist you with CSD to ensure that you are compliant. The first thing is that procurement in government is highly regulated, and there must be accountability. Last year, the President approved the Procurement Act 28 of 2024, National Treasury is still busy finalizing regulations for implementation. Limpopo has set a target of 7 percent of the provincial budget towards suppliers owned by persons with disabilities, said LPT Capricorn SCM Client Support, Ms Mashudu Rasilingwani during her presentation. She underscored that persons with disabilities need to know the departmental mandate, procurement plans, and familiarize themselves with the e-tender bulletin and provincial bulletin for free on [www.limtreasury.gov.za](http://www.limtreasury.gov.za). Ms. Rasilingwani has urged persons with disabilities to upload a doctor’s letter as proof that the supplier is a person living with disability.”*

# Agro-Processing capacity building



Agriculture is the backbone of the province's economic growth, with mining and tourism outlined in the Limpopo Development Plan as strategic focus and potential. Scores of farmers looking to venture into agro-processing attended the workshop, organized by the Department of Social Development in the Sekhukhune District, to share information on how to start agro-processing products.

Sekhukhune Supply Chain Management (SCM) Client Support participated in a capacity building workshop for businesses in the Agro-processing industry at Dichoeung Moshate, Makhuduthamaga Local Municipality, Sekhukhune District. Deputy Director for Sekhukhune District SCM Client Support, Ms Grace Bafedile, made a comprehensive presentation to underscore the importance of compliance for those interested in doing business with the state. Her presentation centered around CSD registration requirements, compliance,

new CSD RFQ functionality, and other key aspects to consider on the CSD system, as well as how to access business opportunities within the state. She added that suppliers must be on the lookout for scammers and contact relevant departments or entities when in doubt to verify fraudulent RFQs.

The University of Limpopo (UL) explained the services they render to assist in agro-processing. Ms Phetole Sibanda, working at UL under Limpopo Agro-Food Technology Station, said different foods that are agro-processed stay for a longer period compared to raw food. She said this contributes to food security and highlighted that their unit is available to provide support to aspiring clients. She described agro-processing as turning agricultural raw materials into marketable commodities. Ms. Phetole Sibanda added, *"Fresh produced food is leaving Limpopo to other provinces like Gauteng for processing. This needs to stop because it can be done locally."* The process to get into agricultural processing was explained, where interested farmers must have an idea, know-how skills, and compliance with health and safety standards. Farmers were encouraged to grab the opportunities shared for creating jobs in various communities.



# Youth Information Awareness



The Limpopo Provincial Treasury successfully hosted a Central Supplier Database (CSD) Youth information awareness on at Senwabarwana Technical and Vocational Education and Training College.

The session was facilitated by Ms Mashudu Rasilingwani from Limpopo Provincial Treasury, who shared valuable insights on how young entrepreneurs can register, update, and manage their information on the CSD platform — a key step for doing business with government. The workshop aimed to empower young people with the necessary knowledge, tools to participate meaningfully in public procurement and contribute to economic growth.

# Capacitating our local businesses

The Limpopo Provincial Treasury has conducted capacity-building programmes for Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises across the province's five districts. The programmes aim to empower rural businesses and provide information on accessing state contracts.

Presenters from the Limpopo Economic Development Agency, South African Revenue Services, Standard Bank, host municipalities, Small Enterprise Development Finance Agency shared valuable insights on business growth, registration and compliance. Attendees were encouraged to utilize available portals and submit quotations online.

Ms Grace Bafedile, Deputy Director for Sekhukhune Supply Chain Management Client Support Centre, presented on the process of doing business with the state, highlighting the importance of registering on the Central Supplier Database (CSD).



Ms Bafedile added that the government has designated groups for empowerment and departments are requested to present procurement reports monthly.

Meanwhile, Deputy Director for Mopani Client Support Centre, Mr Mokgethwa Molele highlighted the importance of being compliant, attaching required documents, and understanding market analysis before making a quote for pricing commodities. Attendees were also urged to utilize available portals to access business opportunities and study departmental procurement plans. The department introduced the online Request For Quotation (RFQ) functionality, allowing access to submit quotations online starting on 1 April 2025.

The Limpopo Provincial Treasury has previously held online webinars to explain how the system works; hence, it saw the need to conduct physical workshops. The session was interactive, with questions posed to presenters and responses provided to participants to deepen their understanding. Participants requested a full session with all key departments, including nationally based ones in the province, to ensure they render full government services.



# Increasing government opportunities in townships



Piensaarsriver - The Waterberg Supply Chain Management Client Support Centre from the Limpopo Provincial Treasury held a capacity-building workshop on navigating the Central Supplier Database to increase government opportunities in township and rural areas.

The session aligns with the government's priority of stimulating economic growth and development to revive the economy and create local jobs. Ms Pearl Makelana, Assistant Director of the Waterberg District SCM Client Support Centre, outlined how suppliers can optimally use the Central Supplier Database (CSD) to seize government and entity procurement opportunities.

Ms Makelana said, *“Constantly update your details on the CSD to remain compliant and grab government opportunities.”* She stressed the importance of listing common commodities on the CSD profile. She urged suppliers to avoid having more than one banking account and to keep it serviced. In conclusion, she warned suppliers against opening fraudulent Request for Quotation links. To avoid scams she advised them to login to view RFQ and encouraged them to contact the relevant department for verification whenever in doubt.



# LPT men say No to GBVF

Limpopo Provincial Treasury men have vowed to play their role in ending Gender-Based Violence and Femicide (GBVF) at an Indaba held at Nylsvei Nature Resort, Modimolle Mookgophong, Waterberg District Municipality. Men were taken on a treat to introspect how they conduct themselves towards women and children. The country is faced with the scourge of killing and abuse of women and children in society.

Mr Steven Machevele, Chief Director responsible for Corporate Services in his address outlined the purpose of the indaba. He said, *“The purpose of this special gathering is under the theme ‘UNITE to End Digital Violence against Women and Children’, We are here as Limpopo Provincial Treasury men to have discussion around the theme and end digital violence against women and children.”* Mr Machevele added that this will provide a platform for men to share experiences, challenges and strategies for promoting a healthy online behavior in preventing children and women abuse.

Representative from Men’s Forum said that the gathering is a significant effort in our communities to build responsible, supportive and accountable men. The Men Sector has committed in working with government, civil society and all to advance progress that address gender violence.

Ms Shoni Nekhavhambe of Women’s Forum highlighted that both men and women need each other to exist. She warned that violence is not the answer and advised that there is a need to communicate and have shared responsibilities as couples. The indaba was attended by health professionals and motivational speaker to encouraged men to also look into their mental well-being and seek help. The indaba coincided with the 16 Days of Activism against Women and Children. It is aims to involve men in tackling Gender-Base Violence and Femicide and mental health issues. This is a step in the right direction that men too have a role to play in ending GBVF.
