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LIMPOPO PROVINCIAL REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE REPORT AS AT 31 MARCH 2018

1. Purpose

To submit to the National Treasury a report on Limpopo Provincial Revenue and Expenditure as at 31 March 2018.

2. Background

The Limpopo Provincial Treasury hereby submit the provincial revenue and expenditure report as at 31 March 2018 in line with chapter 5, section 40 (4) (c) (i) – (iii) of the Public Finance Management Act (PFMA), 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999) as amended by Act 29 of 1999. The Act requires the designated accounting officers of departments to submit to the provincial treasury, information on actual revenue and expenditure for the preceding month and again provided the anticipated revenue and expenditure for the remaining period of the financial year and explanation on material variance.

3. Discussion

The Limpopo provincial government revenue and expenditure trend for the period under review finds its basis on the March 2018 In-Year Monitoring (IYM) reports from various provincial departments. Departmental submissions were duly analyzed in terms of the projected revenue and expenditure, projected cash requests and actual expenditure as recorded in the IYM reports and Infrastructure Reporting Model (IRM) submissions. The explanations for the variances were provided by departments as per their IYM and IRM variance reports and where necessary, further clarity was sought from the departments in line with the requirements of the Provincial Treasury Instruction Notes 03 of 2012, 09 of 2012 and 04 of 2013.



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4. Cash Management

2017/18 Cash Allocation bilateral were held with all Provincial departments from the 15th and 18th of May 2017. The Adjusted Cash Allocation Letters for 2017/18 financial year were issued to all departments on the 30th of May 2017, indicating cash available for each payment run as well as the processes to be followed by departments to enable Provincial Treasury to release payment tapes. Schedule of payments runs were also sent to departments to enable them to inform service providers of the dates of payments as they serve them with invoices for services rendered: -

- PERSAL runs are scheduled 5 times a month, i.e. the 15th for normal salaries, 22nd for Educators' salaries, two Supplementary payments (claims) and month-end for probation, contract employees and third party deductions.
- BAS runs (payments of suppliers) are scheduled twice, i.e. for the action dates15th and for month-end.

These systems and processes were put in place to ensure that service delivery continues without disruptions relating to cash flow problems as well as to alleviate cash flow challenges experienced in the past financial years.

Cash Allocations Vs. Actual Expenditure Vs. Actual Funds Transferred

An analysis of cash projections, actual expenditure and actual funds transferred indicates departments' ability to plan, budget and spend. Table 3 below provides cash flow projections, actual expenditure and transfers to departments during February 2018.

When comparing actual expenditure to the cash flow projections or cash allocations, departments under-spent the cash allocations by R979,362 million or 1.6 per cent. It should be clear that the

under-spending has nothing to do with availability of cash or Treasury interruptions as Treasury has given cash allocations and processes well upfront.

On the other hand, transfers to departments were R827.631 million or 1.3 per cent more than actual expenditure. The reason for transferring more funds than was required is due to the underspending of departments.

It is important to note that interest reported is earned on the group favorable bank balance comprising Exchequer Account, PMG Accounts and the Call Account held with the provincial banker, as well as investment account referred to as CPD held with the South African Reserve Bank. In both financial years, a Call Account is solely used keep funds ring fenced to meet calendar year-end third party payments which become due when all officials are holidays. It is also important to further note that, in public sector though reflecting healthy position, huge favorable bank account and investment balances translates into inefficiencies and ineffectiveness in planning and service delivery. Comparing same period last financial year as indicated in the tables above, interest revenue is at R351.181 million by end of March 2018 which represent 12.15% decrease from last financial year. Interest earned from the CPD account alone was at R328.932 million recording a 13.39% decrease from R379.770 million last financial year

5. Provincial overall expenditure as at 31 March 2018

In overall, the provincial preliminary expenditure is at R61.8 billion or 98.7 percent of the total adjusted budget of R62.6 billion. The highest spending departments are Education, Economic Development, Environment and Tourism, Education, Provincial Treasury, Health and Social Development at 99.3 percent, 99.2 percent, 98.8 percent, and 98.7 percent respectively.

Hereunder is the synopsis of provincial expenditure as at 31 March 2018:

5.1. Spending per Economic Classification

5.1.1. Compensation of Employees

The overall provincial CoE spending is at R42.6 billion or 99.4 percent of the total adjusted budget of R42.8 billion. The highest spending Departments are Education at R23.2 billion or 100.1 percent, a reflection of over-expenditure by R30.8 million or 0.1 percent, Health, Sport, Arts and Culture and Treasury at R12.9 million or 99.8.0 percent, R187.1 million or 98.8 and R279.6 million or 99.8 percent respectively.

- Compensation of Employees (CoE) spent R42.6 billion or 99.7 percent with an underspending of R117.8 million or 0.3 percent mainly in the Department of:-
 - Health at R47.8 million or 0.4 percent due to outstanding pay-progression, grade progression, translations and performance bonuses.
 - Social Development at R21.5 million or 0.4 percent due to outstanding CoE related payments,
 - Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure at R29.9 million or 3.0 percent due to prolonged recruitment processes of filling vacant pots.
 - Transport at R21.1 million or 2.3 percent due to delay in filling of critical budgeted posts.
 - o CoGHSTA at R8.7 million or 0.9 percent due to delay in filling of vacant posts.
 - Sport, Arts and Culture at R1.2 million or 0.6 percent due to non-filling of 25 critical vacant posts.
 - Office of the Premier at R3.3 million or 1.2 percent due to delayed filling of vacant posts.
 - Legislature at R8.6 million or 4.6 percent due to vacant budgeted post that were not filled.
 - Provincial Treasury at R0.511 million or 0.2 percent due to delayed filling of vacant posts and
 - o LEDET at R6.9 million or 1.3 percent due to delayed OSD payments.

The department of Education and Community Safety are overspending by R32.3 million. Education by R30.8 million or 0.1 percent due to appointment of support staff at schools while

Community Safety is overspending by R1.5 million due to appointment of additional employee to support disable persons and increase in Employer contribution to medical aid.

The province is underspending by R117.8 million.

5.1.2. Goods and Services

The overall spending on Goods and Services is at R9.1 billion or 96.8 percent of the total adjusted budget of R9.4 billion. The provincial preliminary underspending is R305.4 million or 3.2 percent.

- Goods and Services spent R9.1 billion or 96.8 percent with projected underspending of R305.4 million or 3.2 percent mainly in the Department of: -
 - Education R155.0 million or 6.0 percent due delay in the appointment of service providers to revamp the department ICT.
 - Health R5.1 million or 0.1 percent due withholding of payments by the department in order to remain within the budget.
 - Social Development R2.2 million or 0.9 percent. Due to preliminary month closure, there are journals which were still in process, the remaining balance will be utilized, which will appear on the final IYM reporting.
 - Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure R61.8 million or 9.0 percent due to delay on the implementation of the 17 roads projects which were advertised during the 2016/17 financial year, the Department has spent less on the maintenance and repair on heavy plant machinery because of less machinery downtime. There is low

plant utilization due to shortage of driver operators which then affects the fuel consumption.

 Agriculture – R26.6 million or 6.3 percent due to late submission of SITA services invoices, payment for insurance for subsidized motor vehicles due to delays in delivery of motor vehicles and late approval to advertise posts.

 CoGHSTA – R5.7 million or 3.3 percent due to the delay in appointment of service provider for security surveillance cameras installation as well as the delay in the submission of invoices.

 Sport, Arts and Culture – R4.5 million or 2.1 percent due to slow progress on the maintenance and repairs of museums.

 Community Safety – R1.3 million or 4.0 percent due to BAS EBT rejections of payments for stipend resulting from invalid banking details for beneficiaries (applicable in Programme 2).

 Office of the Premier – R2.1 million or 1.8 percent due to foreign trips, maintenance and repairs of air conditioners that were postponed.

 Legislature – R16.1 million or 20.1 percent due to delay in meetings for portfolio committees.

 Provincial Treasury – R3.9 million or 3.3 percent due to training that was scheduled to be attended this year but postponed to the next financial year and SITA and computer services invoices and government printer for face value forms.

 Economic Development, Environment and Tourism – R8.4 million or 8.4 percent due to backlog in issuing of purchase orders in SCM as a result of vacant post in the unit.

The underspending is under all the department except the department of Transport which is overspending by R0.591 million or 0.2 percent due to payment of accruals during the beginning of the financial year.

- Transfers and subsidies recorded an expenditure of R7.9 billion or 98.9 percent with an underspending of R91.4 million or 1.2 percent. The following departments are underspending:
 - Education R28.1 million or 1.3 percent due to non-compliance by some schools that are supposed to receive the subsidy.
 - Health R52.0 million or 7.0 percent due to NPI and Households. Transfers to NPI do not follow straight-line.
 - Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure R6.7 million or 0.5 percent due to outstanding invoices for claim against the state which the department did not receive.
 - Agriculture R0.113 million or 0.1 percent due to CASP infrastructure projects that were not implemented on time.
 - Transport R1.4 million or 0.2 percent due to operators that did not meet their contractual obligations in terms of the subsidised trips and kilometres.
 - CoGHSTA- R7.5 million or 0.6 percent due to the disputes between the Queen /Kingship within the Bapedi Kingship.
 - Sport, Arts and Culture R3.3 percent due to non-payment to Library Board, Geographical Names Committee and Arts and Culture Council.
 - Legislature R1.6 million or 1.6 percent due to outstanding payment to one political party due to its failure to submit audited annual financial statements.
 - o Treasury R0.046 million or 0.6 percent.

- Department of Community Safety, Office of the Premier and LEDET are overspending by R6.6 million.
 - o Community Safety R0.0025 million or 178.6 percent due to leave gratuity.
 - Office of the Premier R3.0 million or 168.0 percent due to leave gratuity payments and state funeral approved by the President.

LEDET - R3.5 million or 0.4 percent due to leave gratuity

Province spent R7.9 billion or 98.9 percent of the total adjusted budget of R8.1 billion on Transfers and Subsidies. The province is underspending by R91.4 million or 1.1 percent.

Provincial expenditure on Payment for Capital Assets is at R2.1 billion or 99.2 percent of the total adjusted budget of R2.2 billion. The province is underspending by R314.8 million or 13.1 percent.

- Payment for Capital Assets spent R2.1 billion or 99.2 percent and underspend by R314.8 million or 13.1 percent. The underspending is mainly at the following departments: -
 - The Department of Education R47.0 million or 4.3 percent. All outstanding invoices for infrastructure could not be processed for payment by the end of the financial year.
 - Health R131.8 million or 22.3 percent due to the delay in delivery of medical and allied equipment.

- Social Development R0.644 million or 1.3 percent due to to preliminary month closure, there are journals that are still being passed, the remaining balance will be utilized, which will show on the final IYM reporting.
- Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure R37.3 million or 11.8 percent due to the delay in refurbishment of Legislature offices caused by the Legislature failure to relocated staff to other offices and the overhauling of the ICT infrastructure.
- Agriculture- R27.6 million or 39.0 percent due to g-commerce processes which delayed the procurement of laptops, projectors and pronters.
- Transport R8.4 million or 22.7 percent due to project could not be completed as planned due to poor performance by the contractor.
- CoGHSTA R25.9 million or 68.9 percent due to delay in the construction of Traditional Council offices and the procurement of laptops and office furniture.
- Sport, Arts and Culture R16.3 million or 29.2 percent due to slow progress at Maphalle, Zamani and Mahlabatheng libraries which was caused by the termination of the Principal Agent contract due to poor performance.
- Office of the Premier R0.833 million or 12,9 percent due to delayed procurement of equipment and upgrading of old IT infrastructure equipment, the institution did not receive proper and sufficient quotations.
- Legislature R30.4 million or 86.2 percent due to the postponement of the procurement of the security systems as a result of delayed renovation of the building.
- Treasury R0.915 million or 12.0 percent due to delay in the procurement of IT equipment as a result of delay in the procurement processes.

The department of Economic Development, Environment and Tourism is overspending by R12.4 million or 11.9 percent, due to DBSA contracts for Market Stalls, Upgrading of Nature Reserves, Holding Facilities and Upgrade of Limpopo Wildlife Resorts.

The highest percentage spending departments are Education at R26.7 billion or 99.4 percent Health at R16.1 billion or 99.3 percent and Community Safety at R101.9 million or 100.2 percent whereas the lowest spending departments are Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure at R2.1 billion or 95.6 percent; Sport, Arts and Culture at R261.3 million or 95.0 percent and Legislature at R340.7 million or 85.7 percent.

5.3.1. Agriculture

Overall spending by the department is R313.7 million or 96.0 percent of the total budget of R326.7 million.

- Comprehensive Agricultural Support Programme spent 96.7 percent or R233.9 million of the total adjusted budget of R241.9 million. CASP expenditure is mostly affected by delay in implementation of infrastructure projects. Delays in bids adverts had a negative effect to the grant spending.
- Land care spent R13.7 million which translate to 100.0 percentage of the total budget of R13.7 million
- Illima/Letsema spent R62.3 million or 92.6 percent of the total budget of R67.4 million. Mechanisation budget for Fetsa Tlala private tractor operators and government tractor fleet could not be adequately spent due to lack of rain within the province.
- **EPWP incentive grants** spent R3.7 million or 100:0 percent of the total allocation of R3.7 million.

5.3.2. Sport, Arts and Culture

The department recorded an overall CGs' expenditure of R182.2 million or 95.4 percent of the total budget of R191.0 million.

- Mass Sport and Recreation Programme spent R66.9 million or 98.7 percent of the total budget of R67.9 million. The low spending is due to planned projects that were not implemented during the period such as Limpopo Provincial Sport Awards and Provincial Boxing.
- Community Library Services spent R114.1 million or 94.2 percent of the total budget of R121.2 million which reflects a low expenditure in terms of the norm. Low expenditure is on the infrastructure projects due to slow progress at Zamani, Maphalle and Mahlabating which was caused by the termination of the Principal Agent contract due to poor performance.
- **EPWP Incentive** grant spent R1.8 million or 88.6 percent of the allocated R2 million. The cause for underspending is delayed procurement of material to be used in the museums and payment of EPWP employees which are processed after the month of work performed.

5.3.3. Education

Overall spending by the department is at R2.1 billion or 98.4 percent of the total adjusted budget of R2.1 billion.

HIV/AIDS Life Skills spent R22.9 million or 64.8 percent of the total budget of R35.3 million with a commitment of R5.7 million. The grant has appointed 166 learners support agents in districts. Broadcasting HIV/AIDS related road shows. 4 Deputy Education Specialists(DCES) appointed; salaries for the 3 newly appointed DCES are not debiting the grant. Awaiting delivery of first aid refills. All planned trainings for June 2017 failed due to late approvals.

- National School Nutrition Programme spent R1.115 billion or 94.7 percent of the total
 adjusted budget of R1.2 billion. Low spending is caused by late or non-submission of feeding
 scheme invoices by service providers, deductions made on Service Providers invoices on
 monthly basis due to non-compliance (e.g incomplete Menu) and non-delivery of food stuff
 by Service Providers, and where learners were not fed on certain number of feeding days.
- Infrastructure grant spent R900.2 million or 106.6 percent of the total budget of R844.1million. The spending is high due to payments of accruals. The projects that were put on hold during the Section 100 (1) (b) intervention have now been reactivated due to legal implications however no budget was available for these projects in the current financial year.
- Maths Science and Technology spent R34.9 million or 78.6 percent of the total budget of R44.4 million. The low expenditure is due to the delay in concluding procurement processes to register learners to write Olympiads, the appointed service provider to supply laptops was unable to supply and only 95 percent of schools were able to submit assurance certificates while some schools were unable to submit assurance certificates to have funds transferred to them.
- EPWP Social sector Grant spends R3.2 million or 112.3 percent of the total allocation of R2.9 million and created 137 temporary jobs for school based monitors.
- EPWP Incentive Grant spent R2.4 million or 122.1 percent of its allocated budget of R2 million and 98 beneficiaries have been appointed.
- Learners with Profound Disabilities Grant spend R3.5 million or 35.9 percent of the total budget of R9.8 million. Low expenditure is due to late appointment of outreach team, the first group of outreach team was appointed in February 2018 and the department is in process of conducting interviews for the appointment of the second group of outreach team. Also the appointed Project Manager's salary is not debiting the grant. The delay in delivery of motor vehicles and the procured machinery and equipment contributed to the low expenditure.

5.3.4. Health

Conditional grants spending for the Department of Health are at 95.2 percent or R2.3 billion of the allocated adjusted budget of R2.4 billion and the spending is summarised as follows: -

HIV and AIDS spent 98.6 percent or R1.3 billion of the total adjusted budget of R1.4 billion.
The following contributed to the underspending, Equipment (R0.9m) not yet delivered, invoice
for MMC kits not yet delivered for payment (R1.4m) and saving created on NPIs (R17m) by
making top-up payments on final tranches.

- **Health Professions Training and Development** grant spent R131.5 million or 99.8 percent of the allocated R131.7 million.
- **EPWP Social Sector** grant spent 100.0 percent or R30.1 million of the budgeted R30.1 million for this programme and tranches have been transferred as per planned.
- Health Facilities Revitalisation grant spent 81.8 percent or R415.9 million of the total budget of R508.1 million. Slow construction progress at Maphutha Malatjie OPD. Delayed finalization of the design and documentation of laundry and Contract A6 Letaba Retivitalisation site projects. The Department anticipated buying equipment for Laundries that were advertised and awarded for nine (9) hospitals by the Implementing Agent, Limpopo Department of Public Works, and Roads and Infrastructure. This impacted on the purchasing of the Laundry Equipment which in turn affected the spending of the Department.
- National Tertiary Services grant spent R362.4 million or 98.9 percent of the total budget of R366.3 million. Awaiting submission of invoices for blood products and National laboratory services to the value of R3.4m million.
- Malaria control grant The department has spent R11.8 million or 99.9 percent of the total budget of R11.8 million.

5.3.5 CoGHSTA

In overall, the department spent R1.3 billion or 100.0 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.2 billion.

- Integrated Housing and Human Settlements development grant spent R1.2 million or 100.0 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.2 billion allocated to the programme.
- EPWP Incentive allocation spent R2.0 million or 100.0 percent of the total budget of R2 million.

5.3.6. Department of Works, Roads and Infrastructure

In overall, the department spent R1.1 billion 96.8 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.2 billion

- Infrastructure grant spent R1.1 billion or 98.8 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.2 billion. The low expenditure is due to the delay in the plant hire term contract and the implementation of the 17 roads projects which were advertised during the 2016/17 financial year.
- EPWP Incentive spent R5.98 million or 100.0 percent of the total budget of R5.9 million.

5.3.7. LEDET

The department spent R2.6 million or 100.0 percent of the total allocated budget of R2.6 million of its EPWP Incentive allocation.

5.3.8. Social Development recorded an expenditure of R91.6 million or 94.6 percent of the total budget of R96.8 million.

- Early Childhood Development spend R36.0 million or 87.7 percent of the total budget of R41.1 million. The expenditure will increase in the final reporting of the financial year due to journals being processed with regard to the completed condition assessment to the upgraded ECD sites for maintenance programme per framework.
- Social Worker Employment spent R46.6 million or 99.7 percent of the total budget of R46.8 million.
- **EPWP Social sector Grant** spent R8.9 million or 99.9 percent of the total budget of R8.9 million. The transfers to NPO are done in tranches on quarterly basis.

5.3.9. Transport - Public Transport Operation grant spent R345.6 million or 100.0 percent of the total allocation of R345.6 million.

5.3.10. Community Safety

The spending is at R2.0 million or 100.0 percent of the allocated budget.

Provincial Own Revenue target for 2017/18 financial year was R1.138 billion and adjusted to R1.295 billion during budget adjustment tabling. As at the end of March 2018, an amount of R1.36 billion or 101.5 percent was collected above overall target of R1.295 billion or 100.0 percent. The over collection of R20.0 million is mainly attributed to more collection of interest accumulated on positive bank balances, more proceeds on sale of capital assets than anticipated and recovery of previous year related debts by Provincial Treasury, Public Works and Education respectively. The collection is above that of the previous corresponding period of R1.466 billion or 100.8 percent.

6.1. The following seven (7) departments collected above their set target.

6.1.1. Office of the Premier (Original target of R0.777 and adjusted to R0.550 million)

As at the end of March 2018, collection amounted to R0.747 million or 135.8 percent against annual projection of R0.550 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R0.197 million or 35 percent is due to sale of capital assets without a budget and improved recovery of previous year related debts.

6.1.2. Provincial Legislature (original target of R0.219 million and adjusted to R0.477 million)

As at the end of March 2018, collection amounted to R0.581 million or 121.7 percent against annual projection of R0.477 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R0.104 million or 21.7 percent is due to recovery of previous years' expenditure more than the budgeted amount.

6.1.3. Education (Original target of R41.6 million and adjusted to R61.4 million)

The Department has collected R63.1 million or 102.8 percent compared to annual projection of R61.4 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R2.2 million or 3.5 percent is mainly influenced by the improved recovery of previous year's debts.

6.1.4. Agriculture and Rural Development (Original target of R10.8 million and adjusted to R12.2 million)

Actual collection as at end March 2018 is R14.2 million or 116.2 percent against annual projection of R12.2 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R1.9 million or 16.2 percent is mainly due to more collection on academic services and more proceeds on sale of capital assets than anticipated.

6.1.5. Provincial Treasury (Original target of R188.1 million and adjusted to R 330.4 million) The Department collected R346.3 million or 104.8 percent versus annual projection of R330.4 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R15.9 million or 4.8 percent is mainly due to interests earned from favourable bank balances.

6.1.6. Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure (Original target of R 58.7 million and adjusted Target of R42.1 million)

The Department collected R71.0 million or 168.9 percent compared to annual projection of R42.0 million or 100.0 percent. The over collection of R28.9 million or 68.9 percent is primarily influenced by more proceeds on sale of capital assets and recovery of previous year expenditure related debts.

6.1.7. Community Safety (Original target of R0.115 million and adjusted to R0.116)

The Department collected R0.264 million or 228.6 percent against the annual projection of R0.116 million or 100.0 percent due to more recovery of previous year expenditure.

6.2. The following four (6) Departments have collected below their set projections

6.2.1. Economic Development, Environment & Tourism (Original Target of R152.2 million) As at 31 March 2018, actual collection is R135.5 million or 89.0 percent against annual projection of R152.2 million or 100.0 percent. Under collection of R16.7 million or 11.0 percent is mainly on accommodation and entrance fee and hunting licences due to reduced number of visitors at resorts and decrease in the number of hunting permit applications as well as less collection on gaming taxes. Department remain with uncaptured receipts amounting to R0.056 million.

6.2.2. Health (Original Target of R182.9 million)

Collection as at 31 March 2018 is R172.4 million or 94.2 percent compared to annual projection of R182.9 million or 100.0 percent. Under collection of R10.6 million or 5.8 percent is mainly contributed by less collection on patient fee debts and sale of Capital Assets.

6.2.3. Transport (original target of R494.0 million and adjusted Target R503.5 million)

As at end of March 2018 the department collected R502.9 million or 99.9 percent against the annual projection of R503.5 million or 100.0 percent. Minimal under collection of R0.537 million or 0.1 percent contributed by traffic fines due to lack of system follow up on traffic summon defaulters and warrant of arrest.

6.2.4. Co-operative Governance, Human Settlements & Traditional Affairs (Original target of R2.8 million and adjusted to R4.8 million)

The Department collected R4.3 million or 89.4 percent of the annual projection of R4.8 million or 100.0 percent. Under collection of R0.512 million or 10.6 percent is due to poor collection on sale of capital assets and interest anticipated from implementing Agencies.

6.2.5. Social Development (Adjusted Target of R2.8 million)

The Department collected R2.3 million or 83.4 percent against annual projection of R2.8 million or 100.0 percent. The under collection of R0.583 million or 20.9 percent is due to less collection on commission on insurance and recovery of previous year's expenditure related debts.

6.2.6. Sports Arts & Culture (Adjusted Target of R1.8 million)

The Department collected R1.7 million or 89.7 percent compared to annual projection of R1.8 million or 89.7 percent. The under collection is largely attributed to under performance of Mapungubwe Arts festival due to short changing of scheduled events (poor planning).

6.3.1. Tax receipts (Original target of R475.1 million and adjusted Target of R506.1 million) An amount of R501.6 million or 99.1 percent has been collected against annual projection of R506.1 million or 100.0 percent. The under collection of R4.5 million or 0.9 percent is mainly on gaming levies due to decrease in public participation on gambling activities.

6.3.2. Sale of goods & services non capital assets (Original target of R340.3 million and adjusted to R292.3 million)

As at 31 March 2018 an amount of R278.2 million or 95.2 percent is collected compared to annual projection of R292.3 million or 100.0 percent. The under collection of R14.1 million or 3.5 percent

is influenced by less collection of patient fees by Department of Health as well as under collection of accommodation and entrance fee by LEDET.

6.3.3. Fines, penalties and forfeits (Original target of R 71.6 million and adjusted to R63.9 million)

Fines, penalties and forfeits collected R62.2 million or 97.3 percent against annual projection of R63.9 million or 100.0 percent. The under collection of R1.7 million or 2.7 percent is on traffic fines due to lack of system that regulates the administration of traffic fines and follow up for warrant of arrests.

6.3.4. Interest, dividend and rent on land (Original target of R190.6 million and adjusted to R335.0 million)

Collection as at 31 March 2018 is R348.1 million or 103.9 percent against the annual projection of R335.0 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R13.0 million or 3.9 percent is mainly due to interests earned from favourable bank balances by the Provincial Treasury.

6.3.5. Sale of capital assets (Original target of R10.4 million and adjusted to R13.7 million) The item collected R33.0 million or 240.8 percent compared to annual projection of R13.7 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R19.3 million or 140.8 percent is due more proceeds on sale of capital assets than anticipated.

6.3.5. Financial transactions in assets and liabilities (Original target of R49.9 million and adjusted target to R84.4 million)

The item collected R92.4 million or 109.5 percent against annual projection of R84.4 million or 100.0 percent. The over collection of R7.9 million or 9.5 percent is mainly due to improved recovery of previous years' expenditure by Health, Education, LEDET and Transport.

As at 31 March 2018, the Provincial Infrastructure expenditure stood at R5.3 billion. The total expenditure represents 97.0 percent of the total adjusted Provincial infrastructure budget.

The expenditure was supposed to be R5.5 billion, which represents 100.0 percent of the total adjusted infrastructure budget in terms of the norm. All departments had submitted their expenditure report at the time of the compilation of the report. The province had underspent its infrastructure budget by 3.0 percent. Provincial infrastructure budget was adjusted upwards, with an increase of 9.0 percent or R433.6 million. If the budget had remained the same, the expenditure would be at 105.0 percent which would have been an over expenditure of 5.0 percent.

The Provincial Infrastructure budget for the current financial year is as follows:

Adjusted appropriation: R5.5 billion against the R5.7 billion for the 2016/17 financial year. The overall Provincial Infrastructure Budget during adjustment has decreased marginally by four percent 4.0 percent or R214.3 million from the previous financial year. Payments this month is 16.0 percent or R859.7 million against the adjusted appropriation.

8. Conclusion

The Provincial Treasury hereby submits the Limpopo Provincial Revenue and Expenditure report and the following should be noted: -

- The overall provincial spending as at 31 March 2018 amounts to R61.7 billion or 98.7 percent of the total adjusted budget of R62.6 billion. Of the R55.9 billion total expenditures, R54.1 billion is on equitable share and R7.7 billion on Conditional grants.
- As at the end of March 2018, an amount of R1.36 billion or 101.5 percent was collected above overall target of R1.295 billion or 100.0 percent.
- As at 31 March 2018, the Provincial Infrastructure expenditure stood at R5.3 billion.
- Revenue collection and expenditure performance is monitored monthly and quarterly through IYM and IRM analysis reports and bilateral meetings with Departments and Public Entities.
