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LIMPOPO PROVINCIAL REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE PRELIMINARY REPORT AS AT 31 MARCH 2020

1. Purpose

To submit to the National Treasury a preliminary report on Limpopo Provincial Revenue and Expenditure as at 31 March 2020.

2. Background

The Limpopo Provincial Treasury hereby submit the provincial preliminary revenue and expenditure report as at 31 March 2020 in line with chapter 5, section 40 (4) (c) (i) – (iii) of the Public Finance Management Act (PFMA), 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999) as amended by Act 29 of 1999. The Act requires the designated accounting officers of departments to submit to the provincial treasury, information on actual revenue and expenditure for the preceding month and again provided the anticipated revenue and expenditure for the remaining period of the financial year and explanation on material variance.

3. Discussion

The Limpopo provincial government revenue and expenditure trend for the period under review finds its basis on the March 2020 preliminary In-Year Monitoring (IYM) reports from various provincial departments. Departmental submissions were duly analyzed in terms of the projected revenue and expenditure, projected cash requests and actual expenditure as recorded in the IYM reports and Infrastructure Reporting Model (IRM) submissions. The explanations for the variances were provided by departments as per their IYM and IRM variance reports and where necessary, further clarity was sought from the departments in line with the requirements of the Provincial Treasury Instruction Notes 03 of 2012, 09 of 2012 and 04 of 2013.

4. Cash Management

Original cash allocation letters were issued to provincial departments on 10 June 2019, following Cash Allocation Bi-laterals that were held from 22nd to 27th May 2019. Adjusted cash allocation letters were also issued on 21 January 2020 in effecting changes in line with adjustment estimates. Cash allocations bi-laterals and letters serve to mitigate risk overspending the budget as they enable Treasury to outline and clarify payment and cash management processes, as well as scheduling payment runs and allocating funds for each in line with business plans and cash projections. This also enables departments to set informed payment terms with their service providers in the course of service delivery.

Payments in the province were scheduled as follows during 2019/20 financial year.

- Persal runs are scheduled 5 times a month, i.e. the 15th for normal salaries, 22nd for Educators' salaries, two Supplementary payments (claims) and month-end for probation, contract employees and third party deductions.
- BAS runs (payments of suppliers) are scheduled twice, i.e. for the action dates15th and for month-end.

These systems and processes were put in place to ensure that service delivery continues without disruptions relating to cash flow problems as well as to alleviate cash flow challenges experienced in the past financial years.

Cash Allocations vs. Actual Expenditure vs. Actual Funds Transferred

An analysis of cash projections, actual expenditure and actual funds transferred indicates departments' ability to plan, budget and spend. Table 3 below provides cash flow projections, actual expenditure and transfers to departments during March 2020.

Comparing actual expenditure to the cash flow projections or cash allocations, departments under-spent the cash allocations by R1.231 billion or 1.8 percent. It should be clear that the overall under-spending by departments has nothing to do with availability of cash as Treasury has given cash allocations and processes well upfront.

All departments were funded in line with final appropriation for the financial year without any funds, Equitable Share or Conditional Grants, withheld by either Provincial Treasury or National Departments.

It is important to note that the province generate interest from its group favorable bank balance comprising Exchequer Account, PMG Accounts, Call Account and sub-accounts for Wildlife Resorts and Agricultural Colleges and the Call Account held with the provincial banker, as well as CPD account held at the South African Reserve Bank for Equitable Share flow purposes.

In terms of the table above, the province recorded a 13.38 percent decline in interest revenue from R283.5 million in 2018/19 to R245.6 million last financial year. The decline was on CPD account which dropped 14.67 percent mainly due to change in spending patterns of departments as well as reduction in provincial cash reserve that was utilized to fund priorities and budget pressures year-on-year.

Overall the provincial expenditure is R69.1 billion representing 98.2 percent spending of the R70.3 billion adjusted allocated budget. Hereunder is the synopsis of provincial expenditure as at 31 March 2020.

- Compensation of Employees (CoE) spent R48.4 billion or 99.9 percent of the total adjusted budget of R48.5 billion. The province under-spend by R38.8 million or 0.1 percent.
- Goods and Services spent R10.8 billion or 96.3 percent of the total adjusted budget of R11.2 billion. The province under-spend by R410.7 million or 3.7 percent.
- Transfers and subsidies recorded an expenditure of R8.4 billion or 95.5 percent of the total adjusted budget of R8.7 billion. The province under-spend by R391.3 million or 4.5 percent.
- Payment for Capital Assets spent R1.5 billion or 79.4 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.9 billion. The province under-spend by R390.2 million or 20.6 percent.

The overall provincial CoE spending is at R48.4 billion or 99.9 percent. The highest percentage spending departments are Legislature at 100.5 percent or R221.1 million, Education at R26.2 billion or 100.7 and Social Development at 100.5 percent or R1.2 billion. Department of Education overspend by R171.3 million or 0.7 percent, Social Development by R5.4 million or 0.5 percent, Provincial Legislature by R1.2 million or 0.5 percent, Transport and Community Safety by R9.2 million or 0.9 percent whereas Health, Office of the Premier, Agriculture, Treasury, LEDET, Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure, Cooperative Governance, Human Settlement and Traditional Affairs and Sport, Arts and Culture underspend by R225.8 million. Overall the province under-spend by R38.8 million or 0.1 percent.

The overall spending on Goods and Services is at R10.8 billion or 96.3 percent of the total adjusted budget of R11.2 billion. The highest percentage spending departments are Health at 100.8 percent or R5.2 billion, Cooperative Governance, Human Settlement and Traditional Affairs at 96.6 percent or R194.7 million and Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure at 96.2 percent or R869.0 million. Department of Health overspend its allocation by R43.3 million or 6.8 percent and is mainly influenced by accruals from the 2018/19 financial year. The province under-spend by R410.7 million or 3.7 percent.

The province spent R8.4 billion or 95.5 percent of the total adjusted budget of R8.8 billion on Transfers and subsidies. The highest percentage spending departments are Office of the

Premier at 441.0 percent or R3.2 million which reflects over expenditure, Health at 112.3 percent or R307.8 million and Education and LEDT at 100.5 percent or R2.5 billion and Economic Development at 100.5 percent or R1.1 billion respectively. Overall the province overspends by R391.3 million or 4.5 percent.

The overall provincial expenditure on Payment for Capital Assets is at R1.5 billion or 79.4 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.9 billion. Provincial Treasury overspend by R0.796 million or 4.0 percent. The rest of the departments underspend by R391.0 million. The province underspends by R390.2 million or 20.6 percent.

Provincial equitable share spending is at R60.6 billion or 99.2 percent of the total adjusted budget of R61.0 billion. The highest percentage spending departments are Education at 100.1 percent or R29.960 billion, Health at 99.5 percent or R17.7 billion, Social Development at 98.9 percent or R2.1 billion and Economic Development at R1.9 billion or 99.2 percent. The lowest spending departments are Provincial Treasury at 94.8 percent or R471.2 million, Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure at 94.4 percent or R2.6 billion and CoGHSTA at 94.5 percent or R2.6 billion.

5.3.1. Agriculture

Overall spending by the department on Conditional Grant (CG) is R297.6 million or 88.5 percent of the total adjusted budget of R336.2 million.

- Comprehensive Agricultural Support programme spent 90.3 percent or R222.7 million of the total budget of R246.5 million.
- Land care recorded an expenditure of R12.9 million or 100.0 percent and is mainly influenced by prior year accruals pertaining to Drought Management.
- ILLIMA/LETSEMA spent R54.4 million or 78.7 percent of the total adjusted budget of R69.1 million.
- EPWP incentive grant spent R7.7 million or 100.0 percent of the allocated budget.

• 5.3.2. Sport, Arts and Culture.

The department recorded an overall CG's expenditure of R177.8 million or 77.7 percent of the total adjusted budget of R228.8 million.

- Mass Sport and Recreation Programme spent R71.8 million or 96.0 percent of the total adjusted budget of R74.9 million.
- **Community Library Services** spent R104.2 million or 68.6 percent of the total adjusted budget of R151.9 million.
- EPWP Incentive grant spent R1.8 million or 88.3 percent of the allocated R2 million.

5.3.3. Education

Overall spending by the department is at R2.0 billion or 83.9 percent of the total adjusted budget of R2.4 billion.

- HIV/AIDS Life skills spent R23.7 million or 74.7 percent of the total adjusted budget of R31.7 million.
- **National School Nutrition Programme** spent R1.3 billion or 98.5 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.3 billion.
- **Infrastructure grant** spent R635.9 million or 67.1 percent of the total adjusted budget of R948.1 million.
- Maths, Science and Technology spent R5.6 million or 12.2 percent on its allocated budget
- Learners with Profound Intellectual Disabilities spent R25.7 million or 94.8 percent of the total adjusted budget of R27.1 million
- EPWP Social sector grant spent R13.4 million or 94.1 percent of its allocated adjusted budget of R14.3 million.

• EPWP Incentive Grant spent R2.6 million or 104.4 percent of the allocated adjusted budget of R2.5 million.

5.3.4. Health

The overall spending on CG is R3.337 billion or 101.0 percent of the total adjusted budget of R3.303 billion.

- **HIV and AIDS** spent 99.6 percent or R1.920 billion of the total adjusted budget of R1.928 billion.
- Malaria Component- spend R40.6 million or 89.5 percent of the adjusted budget of R45.4 million.
- **EPWP Social Sector** spent R36.8 million or 98.7 percent of the allocated budget of R37.3 million.
- National Tertiary Services grant spent R428.4 million or 100.9 percent of the total adjusted budget of R424.5 million. The over expenditure is as a result of payment for blood products, surgical implants and surgical consumables invoices for the service rendered.
- Health Professions Training and Development grant has recorded expenditure of R149.9
 million or 101.9 percent of the total budget of R147.2 million. The over expenditure is as a
 result of payment of specialists conducting teaching and training in the service platform. The
 over expenditure will be moved to equitable through journal processing to comply with the
 requirement of the grant framework and avoid unauthorized expenditure.
- Health Facilities Revitalization grant spent 100.4 percent or R593.9 million of the total budget of R591.3 million. The over spending is largely due to the acceleration of progress and expenditure in various projects including Maphutha Malatjie and the turnaround time in the delivery and payment for health technology items. Furthermore, the undertaking by National Department of Health for re-imbursement on the In-kind grant amounting to R85.2 million was not honored as at 31 March 2020.
- **Human Resource Capacitation grant** spent R112.7 million or 151.2 percent of the total adjusted allocation of R74.5 million. The overspending of R38.1 million is as a result of the budget not in line with the headcount on personnel recruited and appointed.
- **Human papillomavirus vaccine grant** spent R19.9 million or 92.0 percent out of the total adjusted budget of R21.6 million.
- **EPWP Integrated grant** spent R2.0 million or 101.4 percent. The overspending is as a result of capturing EPWP additional participants onto the system.
- National Health Insurance grant This grant was converted to a direct grant during the
 adjustment period towards the end of November 2019. The grant has spent R33.4 million or
 104.1 percent. The over spending is as a result of payment of medical supplies invoices for
 the orthopedic procedures.

5.3.5. CoGHSTA

In overall, the department spent R1.3 billion or 97.3 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.4 billion.

- Integrated Housing, Human Settlement Development grant spent R1.3 billion or 100.0 percent of the adjusted budget.
- Deeds Restoration grant spent R10.2 million or 21.9 percent of the adjusted budget of R46.6 million.
- EPWP grant reflected spending of R0.500 million or 24.7 percent.

5.3.6 LEDET

The department spent R3.6 million or 100.1 percent.

5.3.7. Department of Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure

Overall spending by the department is R888.9 million or 76.4 percent of the budget of R1.2 billion.

- Roads Maintenance Grant spent R873.1 million or 85.7 percent of the total adjusted budget of R1.0 billion.
- Disaster Management Grant spending is R9.9 million or 7.1 percent.
- EPWP grant spent R5.8 million or 100.0 percent of the total allocated budget.

5.3.8. Transport and Community Safety

The department has spent R378.5 million or 99.9 percent of its allocated budget of R378.8 million.

- Transport Operation Grant spent R376.8 million or 100.0 percent of the budget.
- EPWP grant spent R1.7 million or 86.6 percent of the budget of R2.0 million.

5.3.9. Social Development

Overall spending by the department is R79.2 million or 96.4 percent of the total adjusted budget of R82.2 million.

• Early Childhood Development grant recorded an expenditure of R68.6 million or 98.0 percent of adjusted allocated budget of R69.9 million.

- EPWP social sector grant spent R8.3 million or 81.0 percent of the budget of R10.2 million.
- EPWP integrated grant spent R2.4 million or 119.3 percent which is 19.3 percent over expenditure or R0.385 million.

The main revenue appropriated target for 2019/20 financial year was R1.316 billion and adjusted upward to R1.379 billion during budget adjustment tabling. As at the end of March 2020, the Province has collected an amount of R1.418 billion or 102.9 percent which reflect an over collection of R39.8 million or 2.9 percent. The over collection is mainly on motor vehicle licences and registration fees by Department of Transport and Community Safety; Casino taxes and surrender of unspent funds by (LTA & LGB) LEDET; Interest on bank balances by Provincial Treasury; Once-off recovery of previous year's related debts by Department of Education; and an improved collection on academic services by Agriculture and Rural Development. The collected annual own revenue target is more than that of the previous year corresponding period of R1.334 billion.

6.1. Out of twelve (12) Departments, seven (7) collected above their set annual own revenue targets as follows:

6.1.1. Office of the Premier (Original Target of R0.583 million and adjusted to R0.587 million)

An amount of R0.597 million or 101.7 percent has been collected against the annual set annual own revenue target of R0.587 million. Over collection of R0.010 million or 1.7 percent is mainly due to improved recovery of departmental debts and previous years' expenditure related debts.

6.1.2. Education (Original Target of R43.826 million and adjusted to R74.993 million)

The Department collected R81.8 million or 109.1 percent against the annual set revenue target of R74.9 million. Over collection of R6.8 million or 9.1 percent is mainly due to improved recovery of departmental debts and previous years' expenditure related debts from DBSA and department of Higher Education.

6.1.3. Agriculture and Rural Development (Original and Adjusted Target of R11.722 million)

As at the end of March 2020, the Department collected R16.9 million or 144.7 percent against the set target of R11.7 million. Over collection of R5.2 million or 44.7 percent is mainly due to improved collection and recovery of student's debts from students at Agricultural Colleges and payments from funders on academic services.

6.1.4. Provincial Treasury (Original Target of R280.874 million and adjusted R235.757 million)

As at 31st of March 2020, actual collection is R243.2 million or 103.2 percent against the set target of R235.8 million. Over collection of R7.4 million or 3.2 percent is due to more interest earned from provincial bank balances which is unpredictable.

6.1.5. Economic Development, Environment & Tourism (Original and adjusted Target of R158.941 million)

Collection as at the 31st of March 2020 amounts to R169.3 million or 106.5 percent against the set target of R158.9 million. Over collection of R10.4 million or 6.5 percent is mainly on tax receipts due to increased public participation of gambling activities and surrender of unspent funds by LGB and LTA. Resorts revenue have under collected due to delayed opening of refurbished Resorts while horse racing taxes collection reduced due to winnings allocated to participants on horseracing and sporting activities.

6.1.6. Transport and Community Safety (Target R584.740 million and adjusted to R618.010 million)

As at end of March 2020, the Department collected R646.3 million or 104.6 percent against the set target of R618.0 million. Over collection of R28.5 million or 4.6 percent is mainly on motor vehicle licenses due to improved recovery of outstanding debts from Municipalities.

6.1.7. Sport, Arts & Culture (Original Target of R2.224 million and adjusted to R2.135 million)

As at the end of March 2020, actual collection for the Department is R2.3 million or 105.2 percent against the set annual own revenue target of R2.1 million or 100.0 percent. Over

collection of R0.112 million or 5.2 percent is mainly influenced by more sale of tender documents than anticipated as well as once-off recovery of departmental debts.

The following five (5) Departments have collected below their set annual own revenue targets.

6.1.8. Provincial Legislature (Original Target of R0.246 million and adjusted to R6.144 million)

Actual collection as at the 31st of March 2020 is R0.001 million or 0.0 percent against the set target of R6.1 million. However, the collection by the Institution is not the correct reflection of exact own revenue collected due to non-interfacing of their new financial system with BAS.

6.1.9. Health (Original Target of R193.610 million and adjusted to R201.861 million)

The Department collected R197.3 million or 97.7 percent against the set target of R201.9 million. Under collection of R4.6 million or 2.3 percent is mainly on patient fee and sale of capital assets. The Department is still capturing the receipts and an improved collection is anticipated.

6.1.10. Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure (Original Target of R30.438 million and adjusted to R38.016 million)

The Department collected R32.8 million or 86.3 percent against set target of R38.0 million. Under collection of R5.2 million or 13.7 percent is mainly influenced by non-disposal of capital assets and scraps and less collection on property rentals.

6.1.11. Co-operative Governance, Human Settlements & Traditional Affairs (Original Target of R5.119 million and adjusted to R26.493 million)

The actual collection as at the end of March 2020 amounts to R25.0 million or 94.5 percent against the set target of R26.5 million. The under collection of R1.5 million or 5.5 percent is mainly influenced by delay in accounting of proceeds from auction sale of capital assets and scraps which took place in February 2020 and less interest received from implementing agency than anticipated.

6.1.12. Social Development (Original Target of R4.182 million and adjusted to R3.910 million)

The Department collected R2.8 million or 71.9 percent against the revenue target of R3.9 million. The under collection of R1.1 million or 28.1 percent is primarily influenced by less collection of previous years' expenditure related debts and on sale of capital assets and scraps.

6.2. Own revenue per economic classification

6.2.1. Tax Receipts (Original Target of R604.232 million and adjusted to R626.496 million

An amount of R651.4 million or 104.0 percent has been collected against the set target of R626.5 million. The over collection of R24.9 million or 4.0 percent is mainly on motor vehicle licences and registration fees by Department of Transport and Community Safety; and casino taxes by Department of Economic Development, Environment and Tourism.

6.2.2. Sale of Goods and Services other than capital assets (Original Target of R305.311 million and adjusted target of R309.777 million)

As at the 31st of March 2020, actual collection is R307.2 million or 99.2 percent against the set target of R309.8 million. The under collection of R2.6 million or 0.8 percent is mainly influenced by less collection on patient fees by the Department of Health; and less collection on entrance fees, camping fees and accommodation by LEDET.

6.2.3. Fines, penalties and forfeits (Original Target of R54.823 million and adjusted to R67.661 million)

Fines, penalties and forfeits collected R77.3 million or 114.3 percent against the set annual own revenue target of R67.7 million. Over collection of R9.7 million or 14.3 percent is mainly due to improved collection on penalties on motor vehicle licences and impound fees by Transport and

Community Safety in the implementation of National Traffic Contravention Management system.

6.2.4. Transfers received from (Original Target of R5.700 million and adjusted to R1.020 million)

As at end of March 2020 there is transfer received amounts to R21.8 million which consist of surrender of accumulated surplus by Limpopo Gambling Board (R0.170 million) and R21.7 million from Limpopo Tourism Agency (LTA). The over collection is due once-off surrender of unspent funds from LTA which was not declared during budget adjustment.

6.2.5. Interest, Dividends and Rent on Land (Original Target of R281.727 million and adjusted to R265.641 million)

Collection as at the 31st of March 2020 is R266.5 million or 100.3 percent against the set target of R265.6 million. Insignificant over collection of R0.840 million or 1.5 percent is mainly influenced by more interests earned from favourable bank balances by Provincial Treasury.

6.2.6. Sale of Capital Assets (Original Target of R12.791 million and adjusted to R20.263 million)

Collection as at the 31st of March 2020 is R5.5 million or 27.3 percent against the set target of R20.3 million or 100.0 percent. The under collection of R14.7 million or 72.7 percent is mainly due non-disposal of capital assets, scraps and biological assets by DPWR&I; and Agriculture & Rural Development respectively. Other contributing factors for under collection on this item is due to accounting of proceeds from auction on sale of goods and services other than capital assets by Health.

6.2.7. Transactions in Financial Assets and Liabilities (Original Target of R52.015 million and adjusted to R87.714 million)

The item collected R88.6 million or 101.0 percent against the set annual target of R87.7 million or 100.0 percent. Over collection of R0.843 million or 1.0 percent is mainly due to more recovery of departmental debts by Department of Education.

As at 31 March 2020, the Provincial Infrastructure expenditure stood at R5.1billion. The total expenditure represents 83.6 percent of the Provincial infrastructure adjusted budget. The adjusted budget is included for some departments.

The expenditure is based on the IYM figures except for the following departments: Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure – Works component, sourced from the March 2020 IRM; Transport and Social Development, which is sourced from the February 2020 IRM.

The following observations are made:

- The Provincial Infrastructure Budget is primarily funded by Conditional Grants. The failure to spend has a huge impact on the Provincial Infrastructure Budget and service delivery.
- The Provincial Infrastructure Expenditure as at 31 March is recorded as follows:
 - o 96.6 percent 2017/18
 - o 96.8 percent 2018/19
 - o 83.6 percent 2019/20

The expenditure for the current financial year is lowest at 83.6 percent compared to the two previous financial years in percentage terms, 2017/18 and 2018/19 at 96.6 percent and 96.8 percent respectively. The recorded expenditure in the IRM was R 4.4 billion; bringing about a difference of about R693.4 million compared to the IYM, which is higher. The difference will only be confirmed once the departments have approved the IRM, the due date being 22 April 2020.

8. Conclusion

The Provincial Treasury hereby submits the Limpopo Provincial Revenue and Expenditure report and the following should be noted: -

- The overall provincial spending as at 31 March 2020 amounts to R69.1 billion or 98.2 percent of the total adjusted budget of R70.3 billion. Of the R69.1 billion total expenditures, R60.6 billion or 99.2 percent is on equitable share and R8.5 billion or 91.9 percent on Conditional grant.
- As at the end of March 2020, the Province has collected an amount of R1.4 billion or 102.9 percent which reflect an over collection of R39.8 million or 2.9 percent. The over collection is mainly on motor vehicle licences and registration fees by Department of Transport and Community Safety; Casino taxes and surrender of unspent funds by (LTA & LGB) LEDET; Interest on bank balances by Provincial Treasury; Once-off recovery of previous year's related debts by Department of Education; and an improved collection on academic services by Agriculture and Rural Development. The collected annual own revenue target is more than that of the previous year corresponding period of R1.334 billion.
- The Provincial Infrastructure expenditure amount to R5.1 billion or 83.6 percent.
- Revenue collection and expenditure performance is monitored monthly and quarterly through IYM and IRM analysis reports and bilateral meetings with Departments.
