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LIMPOPO PROVINCIAL REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE REPORT AS AT 30 JUNE 2015

1. Purpose

To provide National Treasury with a report on Provincial Revenue and Expenditure as at 30 June 2015.

2. Background

The Limpopo Provincial Treasury hereby submit the June 2015 Provincial revenue and expenditure report for the provincial government. Kindly note that this is in accordance with chapter 5, section 40 (4) (b) of the Public Finance Management Act (PFMA), 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999) as amended by Act 29 of 1999, which requires the designated Accounting officer of a department to submit information to the provincial treasury in the prescribed format on actual revenue and expenditure for the preceding month and the amounts anticipated for that month in terms of section 40 (4) (a) and all other necessary information submitted to Provincial Treasury by departments in terms of section 40 (4) (c).

3. Discussion

The Limpopo provincial government revenue and expenditure trend for the period under review is based on the June 2015 In-Year Monitoring (IYM) reports from various provincial departments. Departmental submissions were duly analysed in terms of the projected expenditure, projected cash requests and actual expenditure as recorded in the IYM and Infrastructure Reporting Model (IRM) submissions. The explanations provided for the variances were provided by departments as per their IYM and IRM variance report and where necessary further clarity was sought from the departments in line with the requirements of the Provincial Treasury Instruction Notes 03 of 2012, 09 of 2012 and 04 of 2013.

4. Cash Management

Cash allocation letters for 2015/16 financial year will be issued to departments indicating cash available for each payment run as well as the processes to be followed by departments to enable Provincial Treasury to release payment tapes. Schedule of payments runs were also sent to departments to enable them to inform service providers of the dates of payments as they serve them with invoices for services rendered:-

- Persal runs are scheduled 4 times a month, i.e the 15th for normal salaries, 22nd for Educators' salaries, last Wednesday of the month for Supplementary payments (claims) and month-end for probation and contract employees and Third Party deductions.
- BAS runs (payments of suppliers) are scheduled twice, i.e. for the 15th and for month-end.

These systems and processes were put in place to ensure that service delivery continues without disruptions relating to cash flow problems as well as to alleviate cash flow challenges experienced in the previous financial year.

4.1 Cash Allocations Vs Actual Expenditure Vs Actual Funds Transferred

An analysis of cash projections, actual expenditure and actual funds transferred indicates departments' ability to plan, budget and spend. Table 3 below provides cash flow projections, actual expenditure and transfers to departments during June 2015.

When comparing actual expenditure to the cash flow projections or cash allocations, departments under-spent the cash allocations by R667.792 million or 5.3 percent. It should be clear that the under-spending has nothing to do with availability of cash or Treasury interruptions as Treasury has given cash allocations and processes well upfront.

On the other hand transfers to departments were R213.954 million or 1.8 percent more than actual expenditure. The reason for transferring more funds than was required is due to insufficient funds in some department to surrender 2014/15 unspent funds.

It is important to note that in public sector, a favorable balance translates into inefficient and ineffective planning and service delivery, while an overdraft is only allowed in exceptional conditions. When compared to the same period in the previous year as indicated in the table above interest revenue grows from R65.326 million in 2014/15 to R66.588 million for 2015/16. Interest earned in the CPD account alone grew from R55.667 million to R56.017 million.

5. Provincial overall expenditure as at 30 June 2015

The overall provincial spending as at 30 June 2015 amounts to R12.0 billion or 22.8 percent of the total budget of R52.7 billion. Previous year spending was at R11.4 billion or 22.2 percent of the budget of R51.5 billion which present a 0.6 percent increase. The highest spending departments are Health, Legislature, Economic Development and Education at 25.8 percent, 25.5 percent, 23.5 percent and 23.2 percent respectively.

The lowest spending department is Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure, Social Development and Treasury at 13.8 percent, 16.5 percent and 18.7 percent respectively. Most of the expenditure is incurred under Compensation of Employees (CoE) which is at 23.9 percent against the straight line projection of 24.9 percent. The CoE spending is low due to the payment of the 6.4 percent on Improvement in Condition of Service (ICS) instead of 7 percent and outstanding implementation of ICS for SMS members.

Spending on goods and services improved at 21.2 percent as compared to 16.2 percent during the same period in the previous financial year. The Province is projecting to overspend by R302.7 million or 0.6 percent mainly under goods and services which is under the department of Health at R288.8 million or 2.0 percent due to budget pressures on repairs and replacement of mechanical equipment.

The overall CoE spending is at R9.2 billion or 23.9 percent. The provincial spending is below the straight line projection of 25.0 percent. The highest percentage spending departments are Social Development, CoGHSTA and Health at 26.3 percent, 26.2 percent and 24.5 percent respectively. The Department of Safety and Security project to underspend its budget by R1.5 million or 2.3 percent, while Legislature and Treasury are projecting to underspend by R0.309 million or 0.2 percent and R0.320 million or 0.1 percent respectively.

The spending on CoE will improve after the payment of 0.6 percent arrears on improvement of condition of services.

The underspending is largely due to:-

- Safety, Security and Liaison R1.4 million due to non-filling of sixteen vacant budgeted posts which will be advertised in July 2015.
- Education spent 23.5 percent due to partial payment of ICS at 6.4 percent instead of 7 percent.
- Sport, Arts and Culture spent R34.4 million or 23.1 percent of the allocated budget due to non-filling of vacant funded positions.
- Legislature R0.309 million or 0.2 percent due to the budgeted annual salary increase which is not yet implemented because the negotiation process is still on.
- Treasury R0.320 million or 0.1 percent due to delay in filling of funded vacant posts.

The overall spending on Goods and Services is at R1.5 billion or 21.2 percent of the total allocated budget of R6.9 billion. The province projects to overspend by R296.1 million mainly in Health and Sport, Arts and Culture at R282.0 million or 9.9 percent mainly due to:

- Health R282.0 million or 9.9 percent due to emergency repairs and replacement of mechanical equipment and the upgrading of Polokwane Hospital ICU.
- Sport, Arts and Culture R14.3 million or 9.9 percent due to budget pressures on rental of office building, security, water and electricity.
- Legislature R0.267 million or 0.6 percent due to payment of two month expenditure on accommodation and cellphones.

The department of Economic Development is projecting to underspend by R0.518 million or 0.3 percent due to delay in approval and processing of procurement plans.

5.1.3. Transfers and subsidies

The province spent R1.1 billion or 20.3 percent of the total budget of R5.6 billion on Transfers and subsidies. The province is projecting to overspend by R8.1 million under the department of Health, Sport, Arts and Culture and Provincial Treasury.

The highest percentage spending departments are Provincial Treasury and Economic Development at 51.0 percent and 44.2 percent respectively.

The projected overspending in departments is due to:-

- Health R6.8 million or 1.3 percent due to household's payments of bursaries that always takes place at the beginning of the financial year. The leave gratuity is dependent on resignations and attritions.
- Sport, Arts and Culture R 0.746 million or 8.7 percent for accruals on leave gratuity.
- Legislature 0.1 percent mainly for political party transfers.
- Treasury R0.554 million or 8.6 percent due to payment of leave gratuity to retiring officials.

5.1.4. Payment for Capital Assets

The overall provincial expenditure on Payment for Capital Assets is at R324.9 million or 18.9 percent of the total budget of R1.7 billion. The provincial spending on capital assets has significantly improved from 9.2 percent in the previous year during the same period.

The highest percentage spending department is CoGHSTA at 91.7 percent due to payment for the installation of fireworks in the department. The Province projects to overspend by R0.518 million or 6.2 percent in LEDET as a result of market stalls projects.

The overall performance on payments for capital assets is mainly affected by delays in approval of procurement plans and appointment of service providers which will be attended to in coming financial years. The performance will improve in the second and third quarter as most departments are finalizing procurement process and delivery will be effected later.

Provincial equitable share spending is at R10.9 billion or 23.7 percent of the total budget of R45.9 billion. The highest percentage spending departments on equitable share are Sport, Arts and Culture at 27.7 percent, Health at 26.4 percent and CoGHSTA at 25.5 percent.

The lowest spending departments are:

- Social Development at R253.1 million or 16.5 percent of the total budget of R1.5 billion due to delay in transfers to NPO's and NGO's;
- Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure at R319.3 million or 18.3 percent of budget of R1.7 billion due to delay in implementation of roads projects within the province and nontransfer of funds to RAL;
- Safety, Security and Liaison at R17.7 million 19.6 percent of the total budget of R90.3 million due to delay in appointments of critical funded vacant posts and late submission of invoices by services providers; and
- Treasury at R72.0 million or 18.7 percent of the total budget of R385.2 million due to delay in filling of critical vacant posts late submission of invoices by services providers mainly SITA.

The highest spending departments on CGs are Health and Education R369.5 million or 21.4 percent of the total budget of R1.7 billion and R367.6 million or 19.2 percent of the budget of R1.9 billion respectively.

5.3.1. Agriculture

The department has spent R24.8 million or 7.6 percent of the total budget of R327.5 million mainly under CASP.

- CASP spend 20.0 million or 7.6 percent of the total budget of R261.8 million. Slow spending is due to poor planning for major projects under the grant.
- Illima/Letsema spend R4.3 million or 8.5 percent of the total budget of R50.3 million.
 The underspending is due to delay in finalization of procurement plans.
- Land care spend R0.272 million or 2.7 percent of the total budget of R10.0 million. Term contract not yet finalized due to price escalation.

5.3.2. Sport, Arts and Culture.

The department recorded and overall CGs' expenditure of R25.4 million or 14.3 percent.

- Community Library Services spent R19.3 million or 17.2 percent of the total budget of R112.1 million due to delay in filling of 26 vacant funded posts.
- Mass Sport spent R6.0 million or 9.5 percent of the budget of R63.4 million due to the resignation of sport coordinators and non filling of managers positions for Competative Sport and Limpopo Sport Academy.
- EPWP spend R0.094 million or 4.7 percent due to late finalisation of contact for the workers and other administrative requirements.

5.3.3. Education

Overall spending by the department is at R367.6 million or 19.2 percent of the total budget of R1.9 billion.

- HIV and Aids spent R0.314 million or 1.0 percent. The following contributed in under spending: Delay in filling vacant and funded posts; Delivery of bedside screens which is ongoing; and Printing of LTSM to the value of R1.2 m which is not yet concluded. Training is scheduled to commence mid July 2015.
- National School Nutrition Programme spent R196.2 million or 19.0 percent. New tenders has been advertised.
- Infrastructure grant spent R170.5 million or 21.2 percent. Provision has to be made from the grant to cover Compensation of Employees and Goods and Services for the newly appointed employees. Invoices to the value of R45m have been returned to the service provider for corrections.
- Infrastructure grant (flood damaged) No spending
- Math, Science and Technology R0.200 or 0.5 percent. Procurement of Laptops and Mathematics kits to the value of R20 m and R1 m respectively is in process.
- EPWP (Social sector) spent R0.406 or 13.1 percent. Districts have completed appointing beneficiaries and most activities are scheduled for the second quarter.
- EPWP (Incentive allocation) no spending. Expenditure on the grant is expected in September 2015. The department is busy identifying beneficiaries through Department of Public Works.

5.3.4. Health

The overall spending on CG is R369.5 million or 21.4 percent of the total budget of R1.7 billion.

- HIV and Aids spent R182.9 million or 11.3 percent due to delayed appointment of data capturers, implementation of scheduled trainings, delivery of male condoms and delivery of invoices for ARVs.
- HPTD spend R37.7 million or 31.8 percent of the total budget of R118.8 million.
- EPWP (Social sector) spend R 3.1 million or 15.0 percent. The first tranche R2 million transfers to NPOs for a new project (starting in July 2015) is in process of being transferred. Second tranche of R1.8 million transfers for old projects only due in July 2015.
- EPWP (Incentive grant) spend R0.024 million or 1.2 percent of the total budget of R2.0 million
- Hospital Revitalization grant spent R72.4 million or 37.3 percent of the budget of R194.2 million. The high spending is due to the fact that department started 2015/16 financial year with a drastically reduced budget of R194 million against the following situation, accruals amounted to R25 million. Projects committed (multi-year projects and retentions), amounted to R437 million. A tranche of R35 million was paid to IDT for the implementation of Infrastructure projects.
- National Tertiary Services spent R72.6 million or 22.0 percent of the total budget of R330.5 million. Delay in procurement of medicine as a result of moving from quotation to contract. Awaiting for delivery of the following, consumables to the value of R1.5 million, renal dialysis to the value of R1.8 million and Surgical Consumables to the value of R2.6 million.

5.3.5. CoGHSTA - Human Settlement Grant

The department spent R201.4 million or 15.7 percent of the total budget of R1.3 billion. Low spending was mainly due to relocation and replacement of beneficiaries and non performance by contractors.

5.3.6. Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure

Low spending due to non-transfer to RAL. An amount of R97.3 million was projected but not transfer due to delay in submission of fund request during the reporting period.

- Infrastructure grant spend R59.4 million or 6.0 percent of the budget of R994.8 million.
- EPWP incentive grant spent R0.600 of the total budget of R7.1 million.

5.3.7 LEDET

The departments spent R0.457 million or 18.4 percent of the budget of R2.5 million. Slow spending is due to the delay in the appointment of contract workers for EPWP projects.

5.3.8 Transport

The departments spent R46.4 million or 15.5 percent of the budget of R298.3 million. The spending is in line with the terms of the contract.

Original Provincial own revenue target for 2015/16 is R976.7 million. As at 30 June 2015 has collected R238.5 million or 24.4 percent more than a projection of R176.8 million or 18.1 percent. In overall, the Province has recorded over collection of R61.7 million which is mainly contributed by Provincial Treasury due to more interests earned on bank balances. The collection is higher that of the previous corresponding period of R186.115 million or 21.4 percent.

6.1 Own revenue narrations per Vote

The following Nine (9) Departments collected above their set monthly projections:

6.1.1. Provincial Legislature (Target R0.156 Million)

The Department collected R0.068 million or 43.6 percent compared to projections of R0.065 million or 41.7 percent. The over collection is due to recovery of debts from the previous years which was caused by an erroneous calculation from GEPF.

6.1.2. Education (Target R50.3 Million)

The Department collected R12.3 million or 24.5 percent compared to projections of R12.0 million or 24.5 percent. The over collection is due to once recovery of debts from the previous financial year as well as office rental fees transferred from the Giyani Multipurpose centre (use of former college buildings)

6.1.3. Agriculture (Target R7.1 Million)

The Department collected R3.1 million or 44.3 percent compared to projections of R0.752 million or 10.6 percent. Over collection is due to the transfer of tuition fees from the two agricultural colleges and proceeds from auction sale of capital assets from the previous year.

6.1.4. Provincial Treasury (Target R151.7 Million)

The Department collected R70.1 million or 46.2 percent compared to projections of R16.2 million or 10.7 percent. The over collection is due to more interest received on bank balances and proceeds from sale of capital assets from the previous financial year.

6.1.5. Economic Development (Target R131.7 Million)

The Department has collected R29.4 million or 22.3 percent against projections of R23.7 million or 18.0 percent. Over collection of R5.7 million is due to the surrender of unspent funds from LTA. Own revenue from public entities and gaming levies (R5.2 million) were not accounted for due to late transfers.

6.1.6. Transport (Target R423.6 Million)

The Department collected R91.7 million or 21.6 percent against set projections of R85.7 million or 20.0 percent. The over collection of R5.9 million is mainly due to improved collection on motor vehicle licenses and penalties. However, receipts amounting to R7.2 million remain uncaptured due to BAS performance challenges.

6.1.7. Safety and Security (Target R0.084 Million)

The Department collected R0.022 million or 25.8 percent compared to projections of R0.021 million or 25.0 percent. The over collection is due to recovery of debts from the previous year.

6.1.8. Co-operative Governance (Target R2.7 Million)

Collection as at 30 June 2015 is R1.015 million or 38.1 percent against set projections of R0.286 million or 10.7 percent. The over collection is mainly due to sale of tender documents which was not projected and the recovery of debts from the previous years. These debts emanates from Developers who failed to complete projects in the 2013/14 financial year, which was not budgeted for.

6.1.9. Social Development (Target R2.9 Million)

The Department collected R0.809 million or 28.2 percent against projections of R0.602 million or 21.0 percent due to once off payment of shared service from SASSA, recovery of subsidised kilometers and the recovery of debts from non-governmental organizations.

The following four (4) Departments collected below their projections

6.1.10. Office of the Premier (Target R0.662 Million)

The office collected R0.134 million or 20.2 percent compared to projections of R0.170 million or 25.7 percent. The under collection is due to less collection on parking fees, debts and sales of tender documents.

6.1.11. Health Target (R150.1 Million)

The Department has collected R22.5 million or 15.0 percent compared to the projected amount of R27.8 million or 18.5 percent. The under collection is due to poor recovery of debts on patient fees which has collected **R8.359 million** against projections of **R16.182 million**. The RAF debt collector is on site to ensure speedy lodgment and processing of claims.

6.1.12. Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure (Target R54.6 Million)

The Department collected R7.2 million or 13.2 percent compared to projections of R13.1 million or 24.0 percent. The under collection of R5.9 million is mainly due to less collection on rental dwelling and non-transfer of own revenue by RAL for three months which amounts to R1.3 million. The entity is still to transfer unspent funds / accumulated surplus amounting to R118 million relating to the 2014/15 financial year.

6.1.13. Sports, Arts & Culture (R0.962 Million)

The Department collected R0.097 million or 10.0 percent against set projections of R0.140 million or 14.6 percent. The under-collection is mainly due to less recovery of previous year debts.

6.2. Own revenue per economic classification

6.2.2. Sale of goods & services non capital assets (Target R298.1 million)

As at 30 June 2015 collection is R46.4 million or 15.5 percent against projections of R58.8 million or 19.7 percent. Under collection of R12.1 million is mainly because of non-accounting of own revenue from public entities by LEDET and Public Works, partial implementation of R900 rental fee by Public Works as well as poor collection of debts under patients fees by Health.

6.2.3. Fines, penalties and forfeits (Target R52.6 million)

Fines, penalties and forfeits collected R10.9 million or 20.7 percent against projections of R9.3 million or 17.7 percent. The over-collection is mainly due to improved collection by the department of Transport.

6.2.4. Interest, dividend and rent on land (Target R153.8 million)

Collection as at 30 June 2015 is R70.1 million or 45.6 percent against set projections of R19.2 million or 12.5 percent. Over collection is due to more interest earned on bank balances by Provincial Treasury.

6.2.5. Sale of capital assets (Target R16.7 million)

As at 30 June 2015 there is collection of R0.516 million or 3.1 percent against projections of R1.645 million or 9.9 percent. Collection is for sale of house by the Department of Public Works, sale of biological assets by the Department of Economic Development, Environment and Tourism and proceeds from previous year auction sale of capital assets by the Department of Agriculture.

6.2.6. Financial transactions in assets and liabilities (Target R54.6 million)

The item collected R23.1 million or 42.3 percent against projections of R4.1 million or 7.5 percent. Over collection is mainly due to the surrender of unspent funds by Economic Development and improved recovery of debts by Education.

As at 30 June 2015, the Provincial Infrastructure expenditure stood at R657.9 million, this being the third month (end of Quarter 1) of the financial year. The total expenditure represents thirteen percent of the Provincial infrastructure budget as at 30 June 2015.

The expenditure was supposed to be in the region of about R1.2 billion, which represents 25.0 percent of the total budget in terms of the norm. The province is 12 percent or R600 million below the straight line norm.

It should be noted that at the time of consolidating the expenditure, the department of Sport Arts and Culture had not yet submitted their expenditure for the month of June 2015. For the Department of Public Works Roads and Infrastructure only expenditure for the Roads Infrastructure has been captured.

The expenditure for the following departments had dropped compared to the previous month:

- CoGHSTA expenditure dropped from R96.4 million or eight percent in May to R74.0 million six percent in June 2015
- Social Development expenditure dropped from R10.2 million sixteen percent in May to R2.5 million four percent in June 2015

There was no increase in expenditure for the Departments of Economic Development and Transport compared to the month of May.

The departments with the assistance of both National and Provincial Treasury have uploaded the projects into the new web-based Infrastructure Reporting Model (IRM), the process was finalised by 15 June 2015. Challenges still remain with the new system, as such, National Treasury will conduct a two days executive and champions training for Provincial Treasuries on the web based IRMs on 28 and 29 July 2015. Post the training Provincial Treasury officials will then support the departments and respond to issues raised by sectors. The Provincial Treasury has also nominated one official to be part of the National Task Team to deal with the gaps identified in the new web based IRM. As a result of these challenges the reporting for the current month under review was done manually.

The following are observed:

- The Provincial Infrastructure budget is primarily funded by Conditional Grants representing eighty percent of the entire budget. The failure to spend has a huge impact on the Provincial Infrastructure Budget and service delivery.
- The Provincial Infrastructure Expenditure as at June throughout the three financial years had always been poor.
- The Provincial Infrastructure Expenditure as at 30 June is recorded as follows:
 - o 8 percent 2013/14
 - o 9 percent 2014/15
 - o 13 percent 2015/16
- All departments had poorly spent or have recorded low expenditure as at 30 June 2015, except for Health at 82 percent which is way above norm.
- All departments' project to break-even as at June 2015 except for Health.

8. Conclusion

The overall provincial spending as at 30 June 2015 amounts to R12.0 billion or 22.8 percent of the total budget of R52.7 billion. Of the R12.0 billion total expenditure, R10.9 billion is on equitable share and R1.1 million on Conditional grant. There is a noticeable increase on overall spending by 0.6 percent as compared to the same period during the previous year of which the overall expenditure was at R11.4 billion or 22.2 percent.

Infrastructure expenditure improved from 9 percent to 13 percent compared to the same period last year or from R511.4 million to R657.9 million. Provincial own revenue collected also improved from projected collection of 18.5 percent or R180.6 million to 24.4 percent or R238.5 million.
